

Shahram CHUBIN

Dr. Shahram Chubin is Director of Studies, Geneva Centre for Security Policy (GCSP). He was born in Iran and educated in Britain and the U.S. and is a Swiss national. He currently teaches full-time at the Centre. He also runs an annual (week-long) course on International Security for Diplomats and Officers from the Middle East and organises and hosts an annual conference with the RAND Corporation on the Middle East.

Before joining the GCSP he taught at the Graduate Institute for International Studies in Geneva. He has been Director of Regional Security Studies, IISS (London) and a fellow of the Wilson Center, the Hudson Institute and the Carnegie Endowment (Washington D.C.). He has published widely in such journals as *Foreign Affairs*, *Foreign Policy*, *International Security*, *Daedalus* and *Survival*.
