Mark Fitzpatrick, Senior Fellow for Non-Proliferation at the London-based International Institute for Strategic Studies is the editor of the IISS strategic dossier on *Nuclear Black Markets: Pakistan, A.Q. Khan and the Rise of Proliferation Networks – A net assessment*, published in May 2007. He is currently working on a new dossier on nuclear programmes in the Middle East and is overseeing an IISS study of the requirements for a nuclear weapons free world. He came to IISS in October 2005 from the US State Department, where he spent the last ten years of his 26-year career focussed on non-proliferation issues, including as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Non-Proliferation (acting). His previous postings included Counsellor for Nuclear Policy (liaising with the IAEA) and Charge d’Affairs at the US Mission to International Organisations in Vienna; and head of the State Department South Asia Regional Affairs Office. He also served in Japan, South Korea and New Zealand. He earned a Master’s in Public Policy from the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard and published a dissertation on Korean unification while attending the Japanese National Institute for Defence Studies. He is a frequent commentator on BBC, CNN and other global news outlets, and has published articles on the Iran and North Korea nuclear challenges in the *Financial Times*, *International Herald Tribune*, *Survival*, *The Non-proliferation Review* and elsewhere.
